

Bad Actor Non-Profit Hospitals

California

Cedars-Sinai Medical Center

- <u>Spent 0.8%</u> of revenue on charity care in 2021, despite total revenue of \$6 billion
- <u>Collections policy allows</u> legal action against patients and adverse credit reporting for individuals who are <u>not</u> low-income and underinsured

Massachusetts

Massachusetts General Brigham Inc.

- <u>Spent 0.4%</u> of revenue on charity care in 2021, despite total revenue of \$16 billion
- <u>Collections policy allows</u> legal action to be taken against patients, including property liens and foreclosures

Brigham and Women's Hospital

- <u>Spent 1%</u> of total expenses on community benefit spending; fair share deficit of \$142 million
- <u>Collections policy allows</u> adverse credit reporting and lawsuits against patients

Minnesota

Allina Health

Operates locations in Wisconsin as well

- <u>Refused to see patients</u> if they have unpaid medical bills (suspended policy in 2020, but reinstated it in 2021; finally agreed to end the policy in 2023 after the state Attorney General <u>announced an investigation</u>)
- Sues patients for unpaid medical bills
- <u>Spent 0.4%</u> of revenue on charity care in 2021, despite total revenue of \$ 5 billion

Missouri

Ascension Health

Headquartered in Missouri; operates 142 hospitals around the country

- <u>Spent 1.8%</u> of revenue on charity care in 2021, despite total revenue of \$27 billion
- Hospitals within the system allow credit reporting, selling of patient debt, denying nonemergency care for patients with debt, and legal action (e.g., hospitals in <u>Alabama</u> and <u>Wisconsin</u>)



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New York

New York Presbyterian Hospital

- <u>Spent 0.7%</u> revenue on charity care in 2021, despite total revenue of \$10 billion
- <u>Collections policy allows</u> legal action against patients

Montefiore Medical Center

- <u>Spent 1.3%</u> of revenue on charity care in 2021, despite total revenue of \$6 billion
- Collections policy allows legal action against patients

Northwell Health

- <u>Owns 11 of the top 25 hospitals</u> in New York that pursued lawsuits against patients between 2015-2019 (15,229 total lawsuits out of 28,584 – 53.28% of lawsuits among the top 25 hospitals)
- Northwell Health also <u>sued 2,500 patients during the pandemic</u>.

Washington

Providence St. Joseph Health

Headquartered in Washington; operates in Alaska, Washington, Oregon, California, Montana,

New Mexico, and Texas

- <u>Spent 1%</u> of 27 billion dollar revenue on charity care in 2021
- <u>Sued by Washington Attorney General</u> in 2022 for allegedly failing to inform eligible patients about charity care options, instead sending the bills they should not have owed to collections

Wisconsin

SSM Health

- <u>SSM St. Mary's Hospital in Madison</u> declined in charity care in recent years (0.6% of total revenue in 2020, 0.4% of total revenue in 2021, and 0.2% of total revenue in 2022)
- <u>Collection policy allows</u> lawsuits against patients (<u>including liens and wage</u> <u>garnishments</u>) and adverse credit reporting
- Agnesian Health is now part of SSM Health, but they <u>litigated heavily</u> during the pandemic.



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Advocate Aurora Health

Also operates in Illinois

- <u>Received</u> an estimated \$498 million more in tax exemptions than it spent on charity care and community investment in 2019 – 8th lowest in the country
- <u>Allows</u> reporting of patients to credit rating agencies

Froedtert Health

- From 2017-2019, Froedtert Health and component hospitals <u>filed 3,364 lawsuits</u> against patients
- From mid-March to July of 2020 (the beginning of the pandemic), <u>100 cases were filed</u> by Froedtert Health
- <u>Collections policy allows</u> the denial of medical care for patients with debt, credit reporting, sale of patient debt, and legal actions against patients (although a spokesperson said this is not the current practice)
- Fair share deficit in 2020 of \$87 million (number 13 of 25 hospitals with highest fair share deficits)
